Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Livingston County Development Corporation, a not-for-profit local development corporation, as of and for the years ended December 31, 2015 and 2014, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Livingston County Development Corporation's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audits. We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditors' judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Livingston County Development Corporation as of December 31, 2015 and 2014, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Livingston County Development Corporation's basic financial statements. The management's discussion and analysis on pages 3 - 7, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has not been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, accordingly, we do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on it.

Other Reporting Required by *Government Auditing Standards*

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated March 28, 2016, on our consideration of the Livingston County Development Corporation's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering Livingston County Development Corporation's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

The following is a discussion and analysis of the Livingston County Development Corporation's (the "Corporation") financial performance for the year ended December 31, 2015. The management's discussion and analysis is a summary of the Corporation's financial activities based on currently known facts, decisions, or conditions. The results of the current year are discussed in comparison with the prior year, with an emphasis placed on the current year. This section is only an introduction and should be read in conjunction with the Corporation's financial statements, which immediately follow this section.

Financial Highlights

- Total assets as reported equal \$1,489,749 and \$1,450,967 for the years ended December 31, 2015 and 2014, respectively. This represents a increase of \$38,782, or 2.7% from the prior year.
- Total revenues equal \$548,258 for the year ended December 31, 2015, an increase of \$316,420 or 136.5% from the prior year revenues of \$231,838. Total operating expenses equal \$510,962 for the year ended December 31, 2015. This represents an increase of \$276,123, or 117.6% from the prior year expenditures of \$234,839.
- The Corporation's activities and financial conditions in 2015 did not fundamentally change from 2014. The Corporation did not discontinue any activities or undertake new functions. In 2015, the Corporation closed out three grant contracts that it had been administering: one Rural Area Revitalization Project and two New York Main Street Technical Assistance Projects. Two new contracts were entered into: Housing Trust Fund Corporation for a New York Main Street Program in Mount Morris, Dansville and Geneseo; Empire State Development Corporation for completion of a Strategic Plan. Three New York Main Street contracts were awarded, and entered into in early 2016

Overview of the Financial Statements

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the Corporation's basic financial statements. This report includes the independent auditors' report, financial statements and notes to financial statements that will enhance the reader's understanding of the financial condition of the Corporation.

Required Financial Statements - The financial statements are prepared using the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. The financial statements include:

- **Statements of Financial Position** - Presents all assets, liabilities and the net assets of the Corporation at December 31, 2015 and 2014. The statements provide information about the amounts and investments in resources (assets) and the obligations to creditors (liabilities).
- **Statements of Activities** - Presents the financial activity for the year ended December 31, 2015 and 2014 and displays how this activity changed the Corporation's net assets. The statement provides information on the Corporation's operations and can be used to determine if the Corporation has recovered all of its costs through grants, user fees and other charges.
- **Statements of Cash Flows** - Presents the cash provided and used in operations, investing and financing activities during 2015 and 2014 and how it affects the cash balances at December 31, 2015 and 2014.
- **Notes to Financial Statements** - Provides information regarding the Corporation and explains in more detail the information included in the financial statements.

The Corporation is the lead agency among Livingston County's three economic development corporations for small business growth and downtown development. It operates loan and grant programs to carry out these purposes as well as funds other non-county entities that further small business growth and entrepreneurship.

Current assets, primarily cash, increased 12.7% between 2015 and 2014 due to the fact that the Corporation only funded one new loan in 2015 and several loans were paid in full in 2015.

Financial Analysis of the Agency's Financial Position and Results of Operation

In 2012, the Corporation entered into an agreement with the Livingston County Industrial Development Agency (LCIDA), in which the LCIDA provided the Corporation with \$50,000 per year for the facilitation of the creation and growth of small businesses within Livingston County. The contract is renewable annually and continued in 2015. The Villages program expense decreased in 2015. Grant income increased in 2015 due to multiple factors. First, an additional \$40,500 was received from the County. Also, the Corporation received grant income from the America's Best Communities (ABC) contest in the amount of \$50,000. Next, the Corporation continued to receive funds from the Rural Area Revitalization Project in 2015. Lastly, the Corporation received funds from the Housing Trust Fund Corporation under the New York Main Street grant program. Most of these grants are reimbursement based, accounting for the increase in grant expense in 2015.

The Corporation's Budgetary Highlights

The Corporation operates with few fixed expenses and little overhead. Variable expenditures are principally related to the Corporation's level of activity. By recognition of the variable nature of the Corporation's revenues, the Livingston County Development Corporation minimizes fixed and recurring expenditures and budgets a low level of support services in legal and engineering.

The Corporation believes these are sound practices that are reflected in the Corporation's strong net assets and liquidity both this year and historically.

Factors Bearing on the Future of the Agency

Livingston County Development Corporation has entered into an agreement with the County of Livingston to provide services to prospective and start up businesses, existing operating businesses, or businesses seeking to operate within the County of Livingston including in-depth business assessments, entrepreneurship education and training, business plan development, market development, technical assistance that includes financing, accounting, merchandising, advertising, promotion and business management.

During 2015, the Corporation awarded \$48,453 in Sign and Façade matching grants, which are paid by the Corporation on a reimbursement basis to building and/or business owners. The total grant awards vary from year to year, and decreased from 2014 to 2015. One new village elected to participate in the Downtown Partnership program, bringing the total to nine. Villages have been requested to budget continued support to the Corporation for the 2016 - 2017 program. These increased activities are expected to increase revenues as well as expenses to the program in 2016.

The County of Livingston has continued the Buy Local program. The partnership between the County, Development Corporation and the Chamber of Commerce continued in 2015 with a Memorandum of Understanding and new program activities were implemented.

Revolving loan funds continue to remain available for small business loans. One new loan was made in 2015. Four borrowers paid their loans off in 2015. A minimum of two new loans are expected to be approved in 2016.

Notes to Financial Statements

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies and Nature of Organization

Nature of Organization - The Livingston County Local Development Corporation (the Corporation) is a non-profit local development corporation, created in 1987 by the Livingston County Board of Supervisors and a special act of the New York State Legislature to facilitate economic development in the County. The Corporation was organized under the Public Authorities Law of the State of New York.

The Corporation's mission is to relieve and reduce unemployment, to promote and provide for additional employment, to maintain job opportunities and to better said job opportunities, to instruct and train individuals to improve or to develop their capabilities for jobs, to carry on scientific research for the purpose of adding to the County by attracting business and industry to the area, or by encouraging the development of, or retention of business in the area and to lessen the burden of government and to act in the public interest.

Basis of Accounting - The Corporation prepares its financial statements on the accrual basis of accounting.

Estimates - The preparation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Basis of Presentation - Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 958, *Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations*. Under ASC 958, the Corporation is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets; unrestricted net assets, temporarily restricted net assets, and permanently restricted net assets. These classes are established in accordance with their nature and purpose, in observation of any third party limitations or restrictions placed on the use of these resources. Any donor-restricted contribution whose restrictions are met in the same reporting period or any gifts of long-lived assets are reported as unrestricted support. The Corporation did not have any temporarily restricted net assets or permanently restricted net assets for the years ended December 31, 2015 and 2014.

Unrestricted Net Assets - Unrestricted net assets represent net assets that are not subject to donor imposed stipulations and are generally available for support of the Corporation's activities. The Board of Directors has discretionary control over these resources to carry out the operations of the Corporation in accordance with its by-laws.

Cash and Cash Equivalents - For the purposes of the statements of financial position and statements of cash flows, cash and cash equivalents include deposits with original maturities of three months or less. The Corporation maintains cash and cash equivalents which periodically may exceed federally insured limits.

Allowance for Uncollectible Loans - The allowance for uncollectible loans consists of the provision for loan losses charged to operations based upon management's evaluation of the loan portfolio considering such factors as historical loan experience, review of specific loans, current economic conditions and such other factors as management considers appropriate to estimate loan losses. Loan losses and the recovery of loans previously charged off are charged or credited to the allowance as incurred or realized, respectively. The allowance for uncollectible loans at December 31, 2015 and 2014 was \$12,656 and \$22,656, respectively.

Deferred Revenue - Deferred revenue arises when a potential revenue does not meet both the measurable and available criteria for recognition in the current period. Deferred revenue also arises when resources are received by the Corporation before it has a legal claim to them, as when grant monies are received prior to the occurrence of qualifying expenditures. In subsequent periods, when both recognition criteria are met, or when the Corporation has legal claim to the resources, the revenue is recognized.

Related Party - The Corporation is related through common management and Board of Directors membership with the Livingston County Industrial Development Agency (IDA) and the Livingston County Capital Resource Corporation (CRC), which also promotes economic development in the County. In both 2015 and 2014, the IDA contributed \$50,000 to the Corporation, which is shown as grant income in the accompanying statement of activities.

Income Taxes - The Corporation is a not-for-profit corporation and is exempt from income tax under IRC 501(c)(4) and New York State Article 14 as a local development corporation. Accordingly, no provision for taxes has been made.

In accordance with ASC 740-10-50, *Accounting for Uncertainty in Income Taxes*, the Corporation recognizes the tax benefits from uncertain tax positions only if it is more likely than not that the tax position will be sustained on examination by the taxing authorities. Management believes that the Corporation is currently operating in compliance with the applicable requirements of the Internal Revenue Code. Therefore, no liability for unrecognized tax benefits has been included on the Corporation's financial statements.

Advertising - The Corporation expenses all advertising costs as they are incurred. Advertising expense amounted to \$9,610 and \$21,405 for the years ended December 31, 2015 and 2014, respectively.

Subsequent Events - Management has evaluated subsequent events through the date of the report which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Note 2. Deposits and Investments

Cash and Investments - The Corporation's investment policies are governed by State statutes. In addition, the Corporation has its own written investment policy. Corporation monies must be deposited in FDIC-insured commercial banks or trust companies located within the State. The Corporation's Director is authorized to use interest bearing demand accounts and certificates of deposit. Permissible investments include obligations of the U.S. Treasury and U.S. agencies, repurchase agreements and obligations of the State of New York and its localities.

Collateral is required for demand deposits and certificates of deposits not covered by federal deposit insurance. Obligations that may be pledged as collateral are obligations of the United States and its agencies and obligations of the State and its municipalities and school districts.

Investment and Deposit Policy - The Corporation follows an investment and deposit policy, the overall objective of which is to adequately safeguard the principal amount of funds invested or deposited; conformance with federal, state and other legal requirements; and provide sufficient liquidity of invested funds in order to meet obligations as they become due. Oversight of investment activity is the responsibility of the Corporation's Director.

Interest Rate Risk - Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value of investments will be affected by changing interest rates. The Corporation's investment policy does not limit investment maturities as a means of managing its exposure to fair value losses arising from increasing interest rates.

Credit Risk - The Corporation's policy is to minimize the risk of loss due to failure of an issuer or other counterparty to an investment to fulfill its obligations. The Corporation's investment and deposit policy authorizes the reporting entity to purchase the following types of investments:

- Interest bearing demand accounts.
- Certificates of deposit.
- Obligations of the United States Treasury and United States agencies.
- Obligations of New York State and its localities.

Custodial Credit Risk - Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a failure of a depository financial institution, the reporting entity may not recover its deposits. In accordance with the Corporation's investment and deposit policy, all deposits of the Corporation including interest bearing demand accounts and certificates of deposit, in excess of the amount insured under the provisions of the Federal Deposit Insurance Act (FDIC) shall be secured by a pledge of securities with a value equal to 100% of the aggregate amount of deposits. The Corporation restricts the securities to the following eligible items:

- Obligations issued, fully insured or guaranteed as to the payment of principal and interest, by the United States Treasury and United States agencies.
- Obligations issued or fully insured or guaranteed by New York State and its localities.

We have audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of the Livingston County Development Corporation, (a non-profit local development corporation), as of and for the year ended December 31, 2015, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Livingston County Development Corporation's basic financial statements and have issued our report thereon dated March 28, 2016.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered the Livingston County Development Corporation's internal control over financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Livingston County Development Corporation's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Livingston County Development Corporation's internal control.

A *deficiency in internal control* exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A *material weakness* is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A *significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or, significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.
